PRESIDENTS REPORT 2020

I am pleased to present the 48th Annual Report for the Christchurch Football Squash Club and to summarise the year for 2020.

2020 has been a year of firsts for us all with new vocabulary to explain our year at work, home and in our interactions in our squash communities including bubbles, lockdown and social distancing. The challenges that came from the COVID pandemic impacted the club at the start of our membership year with a large portion of our members waiting until after the lockdown to re-join, and some choosing not to re-join at all with an overall reduction in our membership numbers. The committee offered a discount on the subscriptions due to the club being closed for approx. 6 weeks, with many members re-joining by the end of May, although at that point there was no certainty on when things like interclub and tournaments would resume.

As in 2019 we also saw a decline in volunteer numbers, with some vacancies in key committee positions arising throughout the year, that are currently being filled by people already volunteering their time in other roles. The balance between keeping a "club" atmosphere and maintaining a viable organisation is getting harder to sustain under the current structure, with the limited resources on hand.

On the Court

With no Autumn interclub competition due to COVID, Football fielded 12 teams in the winter interclub round: 9 Men's and 2 Women's plus 3 women in a composite super league competition and 10 Junior members playing in the composite junior division. In the men's Football 2 were runner-up in Division 2, Football 6 were runner-up in Division 5 and Football 7 were runner-up in Division 6. The juniors had good success within their combined league formats during the winter season with a number of them taking the next step to the Senior interclub level in the Spring competition. It is exciting to see our junior members develop both on and off court and the potential for the coming years ahead for the club.

While Squash Canterbury did not host an awards event this year, they still recognised achievements and service within the Squash community including:

- Canterbury Club & School Coach of the Year winner: Adam Odering
- Services to Squash recipient: Aaron Warner
- Volunteer of the year nominee: Aaron Worner
- Canterbury Open Women's winner: Emma Cormack

Currently the club has the following nationally ranked players:

- Under 17 Girls: ranked 8 is Petra Curd-McCullough
- Under 19 Girls: ranked 11 is Ella Knutson
- Masters 35 Men: ranked 4 is Jason Cumpstone
- Masters 65 Women: ranked 1 is Freda Walker
- Masters 65 Men: ranked 2 is Wayne Seebeck

Our Football Open tournament was initially scheduled for the first weekend in May and this was postponed at the time, due to NZ being in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown. The club was able to reschedule our Open and it was held during the weekend of 17-19 September. This year the Football Open had a total of 76 entries

(86 in 2019). The draws were divided into Men's 6 x 8 draws, 1 x 6 round robin draw, and 2 x 4 round robin draws. Women's 1 x 6 draw round robin and 2 x 4 round robin draws. There were 17 out of town players from Marlborough, Te Puke, Nelson, Blenheim, Kaikoura, Rakaia, and Otago University. We were comfortably able to schedule all 114 games at Football over the weekend. We chose to finish the tournament on Saturday night, with finals scheduled for 7:40pm. This was because of the reduced entry numbers, which was partly due to the tournament taking place under Level 2 restrictions, and also as this allowed us to the run the tournament in 3-game draws, rather than the 4-game draws used for the last few years. Thank you to our tournament sponsor Mary Turnbull – Harcourts Gold who once again sponsored the entire tournament and to Aaron Warner who was the tournament organiser.

Thanks to the club captains Emma Cormack and Aaron Warner for their organising and team selection for interclub competitions. This was Emma's third year in the role and Aaron's second year.

Club Champs were held later than usual in October, due to the tournament calendar being delayed due to COVID. This year we ran the junior championships alongside the senior championships, and while we had slightly lower entries than usual, we had a number of competitive and hard fought games. Congratulations to our Senior Club Champions – Emma Cormack (Women's), Jayden Millard (Men's), and Junior Club Champions – Petra Curd-McCullough (Girls), Jack Lamb (Boys).


Currently we have 191 members which 36 members less than this time last year (2019 – 227).

Finance

Financially the club made an operating profit of \$33,232 compared with the 2019 loss of (\$1,909). This is largely thanks to assistance received during COVID particularly from the Sports Canterbury Resilience Fund. As a club we were able to reschedule both our Open and the Canterbury Masters tournaments after postponements due to COVID, which also assisted with our revenue.

In 2020, the club received a total of \$39,754 from charitable trusts and grants (\$19,594 in 2019), including \$20,733 from Sport Canterbury Resilience Funding, \$14,000 from MSD Covid19 Wage subsidies, \$3,000 from Mainland Foundation for running costs and the remaining balance from donations to the club. This assisted the club greatly this year, especially with the funders having less funds available. As in previous years funding is getting harder to receive and cannot be guaranteed when looking at the overall budget in ensuring the club can meet its ongoing costs.

Therefore, fundraising within the club continues to be an important income stream, this year raising \$3,822. The committee ran two main events a Quiz night at Bailies, pre Xmas 2019 raising \$1,150 and also a night at Addington Races raising \$1,606. Thank you to Helen Benington who organised the Race night including the many raffles. Other fundraising during the year included hoodies, raising \$520, the lotto bonus raffle raising \$500 and a thank you to the social Thursday night members who supported raffles most weeks raising \$420.



Bar revenue has declined this year, mostly impacted by the decrease in functions revenue due to a smaller number of functions held at the club as we had a couple cancel due to being impacted by COVID level restrictions.

Our operating expenses were well maintained during this year with reductions occurring over the 6 weeks the club was closed, as the committee turned off the hot water etc. and the reduction in club use during May & June as the country moved down the COVID levels. Rent was also reduced as our landlord rebated the club three months' rent due to the impacts of COVID.

I thank our club sponsors who continue to support the club. Mary Turnbull (Harcourts), Roger Symes (Prime Kitchens), Anderson & Hill, Super Liquor Papanui, Lion Nathan and welcome a new sponsor Ashton Wheelans for the coming year. We are incredibly appreciative for their support, which assists our Football club to run as successfully as it does.

Bar/Social

We continue to hire out the club facilities, although this too was impacted by COVID with only 5 functions held throughout the year, (2019 there was 10), with gross bar takings this year decreasing to \$7,171 from \$12,739. Western Football used our facilities as their clubrooms for after match functions on Saturdays during the winter season, for the ninth year. Their season was delayed however Mainland Football managed to schedule a full season of games, so Western's support resulted in \$10,072 gross bar revenue (a slight decrease from \$10,131 in 2019).

The year started with a social Pre-Season tournament just prior to lockdown. The club continued with our regular Thursday inhouse leagues which are well supported. Summer League and Wednesday Club nights continue to be successful and areas for new members to be involved and our 5-week winter leagues are also greatly enjoyed by our more social members. Thanks to Denis Bosworth for running Senior Club Night again this year.

Toward the end of the year the Club Prizegiving was held in the club lounge and saw a mix of social, junior and senior members and families socialising together and enjoying the grazing platter from the Twisted Flour & Sugar Merchants which looked and tasted great with something to suit everyone!

Property

Just prior to coming out of lockdown the club was broken into with the deadbolt lock into the bar smashed, the till damaged and the Salming cabinet cupboard doors forced open. Basically nothing was stolen as there was no money in the till due to the club being shut, and the alarm scaring the wannabe burglar off. This has meant the committee with the insurance payout invested in a new bar lock and a near new second-hand till, with the bar doorframe also needing repairs.

The main heatpump in the lounge needed repairing, and thanks to Angus for liaising with the manufacturer as we managed to have the parts covered under warranty with the club only needing to cover the installation costs. At the beginning of summer one of the heatpumps' in the court area motherboard failed. Given the age of the heatpump the committee is leaning towards replacing rather than repairing and so has put this on hold until early in 2021. Other repairs and maintenance for 2020 are mostly related to the quarterly building compliance costs, the bar chiller fan motor being replaced and replacement battery and pads for the defibrillator.

Thanks to Hamish Oakley for looking after our gardens for the club.

Coaching and Junior Development

Adam is currently in his 10th year as the Christchurch Football Squash Club Coach. Adam runs the Club's weekly junior programme with 20-30 juniors participating all year round, providing the foundation for the clubs junior development, success and participation.

Adam provides individual coaching to many club members, and is currently coaching a number of nationally ranked players, including juniors Petra Curd-McCullough, Harry O'Loughlin and Scott Butterick.

Adam was selected to be the Canterbury Junior Team Coach for the Nationals held recently in Christchurch. He has run two performance camps alongside Paul Hornsby for Canterbury pre-elite juniors with this to continue in 2021 with four camps on the calendar. Adam has also run senior training sessions alongside Craig Hibbert with the focus on young adult players who have recently moved on from juniors. This concept will also be continued in 2021.

Also, congratulations to Adam for being the Squash Canterbury Squash NZ Club/School Coach of the year for 2020, which is a great achievement with the challenges of the year.

Thanks to the parents who continue to support the club in the junior area. A thank you to Rocky Hudson for your work as our junior co-ordinator earlier in the year and we welcome Ethan Peddie into the role.

Squash Canterbury

During 2020 Squash Canterbury appointed a new CEO, Kristy Havill. She has continued the level of service and communication to the clubs from SC as in the prior

years. Unfortunately COVID impacted on the initiative of a Tournament Road – with the hope to improve participation at all tournaments in the Canterbury region, however this will now feature in 2021. The Junior Development Co-ordinator role has continued in 2020 with extra tournaments for juniors and junior girls that seem to be encouraging the uptake of our sport to the wider public.

<u>Acknowledgements</u>

Thanks to the 2020 committee who worked hard and offered hours of unpaid support enabling the club to function as well as it does, especially the work required to manage the club during the many COVID levels and implications.

Thanks to Grace Allen in the administrator role which covers the membership database functions and keeps you our members informed and up to date. Thanks to Helen Benington who ran the winter social leagues and those who assist me with the Thursday night summer league. Congratulations to Andrew for your Bar Manager efforts in keeping our bar well stocked, as this is much appreciated by us all. Thanks to Tony Stoneman who cleans the club each week, again it is appreciated.

The club has some very dedicated and hardworking volunteers, which are needed for the club to function. However, we need more people to volunteer where they can, across all functions of the club, whether working bees, tournament volunteers, committee members and to share the efforts required to keep our amazing club running. This also has the advantage of sharing the knowledge which is important for the longevity of the club. The committee welcome people to assist with any role, as not all roles require the time commitment of being on the committee.

To the incoming 2021 committee I wish you the best for your efforts in looking to increase the profile and membership of our great club, while also managing the day to day functions, and to all our members I look forward to seeing you all back on court in 2021.

TREASURERS REPORT 2020

I would like to present the Christchurch Football Squash Club financial statements for the year ended 31 October 2020. The club has recorded an overall net profit for the year of \$5,881 compared to 2019 of (\$29,136). The operating profit is \$33,232 compared to an operating loss in 2019 of (\$1,909)

- Gross Income is \$26,124 and is a decrease of \$4,382 from \$30,506 in the prior year.
 - o Bar Sales are slightly down on last year with a decrease in revenue of \$3,052. The Gross Profit is 52.17%, compared to 49.02% in 2019 and this is due to an increase in the bar prices to assist to cover some costs which have increased. Thank you to Andrew Hawkey and other bar staff for their ongoing efforts in running the bar.
 - The Salming Shop provided sales of \$5,425 (2021 \$13,755) and net income of \$822 (2019 \$2,152), in what has been a difficult year. Thanks to Adam Ordering for his ongoing work in this area. The committee and Adam have agreed that Adam will take full ownership of the Salming shop for 2021 with the agreement know being that the club will receive revenue via a share of the profits for the use of the space.
- Function revenue in both bar sales and venue hire income has decreased this year, with only 5 functions held. Functions bar revenue decreased by approx. \$5,500 in takings to \$7,171 from \$12,739 in 2019.
- Sponsorship for the year was received from Mary Turnbull, Prime Kitchens, Super Liquor Papanui & Edgeware and Anderson and Hill.
- Subscriptions have remained constant with only a 1% decrease to \$40,537 from \$40,958 in 2019.
- Tournament Income increased by \$535 from 2019, as the club was able to hold a club Pre-Season tournament, our Football Open and Canterbury Masters although they were delayed and entries affected by COVID
- Visitor Income decreased by 26.2% from \$3,911 in 2019 to \$2,887 in 2020.
- Donations/Funding increased 102.8% to \$39,754 from \$19,594 last year.
 Thank you to our funders, especially the Sports Canterbury Resiliance Fund which round two was \$19,733. Other funders this year included the Mainland Foundation, and the wage funding by Ministry of Social Development COVID grants.
- Total operating expenses were \$91,811 compared with \$113,781 in 2019. This
 is an decrease of 19.3%. Contributing factors were repairs and maintenance
 decreasing by \$2,497, a rent deduction with our landlord giving us 3 months
 rent free due to the impacts of COVID, and other costs also impacted by the
 club being closed for 6 weeks and the reduction in competitive play during May
 & June.
- Non-Operating Expenses (depreciation) total \$27,351 compared with \$27, 327 in 2019.
- The club has cash assets of \$44,539 as at 31 October 2020 compared to 6,603 as at 31 October 2019.
- Stock on hand in the bar and Salming stock at the 31 October 2020 is \$9,087 compared with \$12,873 in 2019.
- The club has no term debt as at 31 October 2020.

• Fixed Assets are recorded at \$2,128,618 from the prior year balance of \$2,156,084. The club revalued the building in 2016 to the insurance value. No assets were purchased during the year.

As a committee our aim is to have the club run at a breakeven point while maintaining the clubs assets. The club is reliant on the help of its sponsors and also the grants we receive, however we cannot count on always receiving grants and for this reason all major repairs in future will be dependent on grants received and the fundraising efforts of the club. The committee have turned last few years deficits around to increase our cash assets of the club and to run at an operational profit this year in difficult circumstances, however the committee are very aware this is not a given trend and to allow us to not increase subs substantially in coming years will focus on increased membership and some other fundraising ideas.

The proposed subs for 2021 have been kept at the same level as 2020 due to the cost savings the committee managed during lockdown.

Club Name Change Proposal Proposal for a name change for the club - Why should CFSC vote to change its name?

As you'll be aware 2020 has been a struggle for all organisations and this is no different for the squash club, with membership numbers dropping by 20-25% on the same time last year. This is on top of a year on year gradual decline over the past several years due to many external factors effecting squash and sports participation in general. We are aware as a committee that these trends are not sustainable and that significant effort into reversing this trend is needed.

You may or may not be aware, that the committee is working on a marketing plan to attract new membership that will be gradually executed in the new year. In essence this focuses on increasing awareness of the club, promotion of its benefits and a focus on the target membership groups and getting new members through the door and embedded in the sport of squash. To do this we will be rolling out

- Street signage
- Household flyers
- Targeted Facebook marketing campaigns
- New introductory packages to attract and support new members
- Other profile creating activities

Additionally you would have noticed that we have refreshed the clubs logo. This was essential to make the clubs pending marketing campaign current & relevant to the target new membership. In the same vein various club members have raised the issue of the clubs name and the prospect of making it more relevant as we go through this change process. In essence the rational behind the question of the clubs name is as follows

- The term "Football" has no future relevance to the club
- The term "Christchurch" is confusing with the new Christchurch Squash Club in cashmere
- The combined term "Christchurch Football" is too long

In essence our current name has no point of difference for the club. From a marketing perspective it will inhibit our future ability to get our message out to potential new members as it is confusing and not unique.

Our proposal is to ask the clubs membership at the 2021 AGM if they will support a name change for the club. If this was to pass, then a vote will be taken on a preferred name. We are therefore asking members to submit ideas to the committee from which a shortlist will be created. Submissions should focus on a unique name (within the squash community that will be relevant in future years.

It should be noted that a name change is about a focus on the future of the club and is not intended to discard or offend past members and the great work they have achieved over the years for both the squash club and the rugby club next door. There is a need however for the squash club to drive its own path forward and this is just small piece of the puzzle. To me and many others Spark will always be called Telecom and I expect this case to be no different.

One point that remained unanswered was how would we measure if the name change is successful?

PRESIDENTS REPORT 2021

I am pleased to present the 48th Annual Report for the Christchurch Football Squash Club and to summarise the year for 2021.

2021 continued on from last year with bubbles, lockdowns and social distancing, still being key to our participation at work, home and in our squash communities at various times through the year. With a four week lockdown in August, winter interclub and our club leagues were impacted this year.

As in 2020 we saw a decline in volunteer numbers, with a few key club members continuing in contributing their time across all areas and functions of the club. With fewer people assisting the balance between keeping a "club" atmosphere and maintaining a viable organisation is getting harder to sustain under the current structure, so please consider helping out where you can.

On the Court

With a four week lockdown in August, winter interclub had only had two weeks of competition before it was cancelled, however there was a full Autumn round and the Spring round was also back to normal.

We fielded 10 teams in the autumn interclub round: 8 Men's and 2 Women's teams with a few women also playing for other clubs. Additionally, we had 3 Junior members playing in the composite division. In the men's, Football 7 were winners of Division 5 and 3 other teams made their division finals. In the Women Football Tahi won Division 1. Unfortunately, the winter interclub round had only just started when COVID lockdown occurred due to the Delta variant breaking into the community, and this meant the remaining rounds were cancelled.

Squash Canterbury did not host an awards event this year, however they still recognised achievements and service within the Squash community including:

- Services to Squash recipient: Aaron Worner
- Canterbury Open Women's winner: Emma Cormack

Currently the club has the following nationally ranked players:

- Under 17 Girls: ranked 8 is Petra Curd-McCullough
- Masters 65 Women: ranked 1 is Freda Walker
- Masters 65 Men: ranked 2 is Wayne Seebeck

Our **Football Open** tournament was held the first weekend in May, and was part of the Squash Canterbury Tournament Roadshow, which meant 8 draws were predominantly used. This year the Football Open had a total of 119 entries (76 in 2020), with 11 men's draws and 4 women's draws. There were 25 out of town players, including from Marlborough, Kaikoura, Oamaru, Greymouth, Fairlie, Methven, Hinds,

Nelson, Otago University, and Palmerston North. We chose to schedule all 174 games at Football over the weekend. To accommodate this, we extended the tournament into Sunday afternoon, with finals scheduled for 3:40pm. Thank you to our tournament sponsor Mary Turnbull – Harcourts Gold who once again sponsored the entire tournament. Also a thank you to Nathan Smith and Nurse Call Solutions, who sponsored a livestream of Court 2 for all Men's Open games, as well as selected Women's Open and Men's Division 1 games.

As part of the roadshow requirements the club put on a Spit roast meal on the Saturday evening which was enjoyed by a large number of the participants. Thanks to Aaron Worner, Wayne and team who assisted with the cooking of the spit roast. Lastly many thanks to Aaron Warner who was the tournament organiser.

The **Canterbury Junior Open** was held as a stand-alone tournament at Football on 28-30th May 2021. There was a total of 60 entries (up from 26 when last held at Football in 2017), with 20 J graded players between both the boys and girls draws – this was good to see the next generation coming through and playing tournaments. A large contingent came from Marlborough and there were also entries from Greymouth and Nelson. In the boys there were 4 draws: 1 x 16 draw, 1x 12 draw, 1 x 8 draw, and 1 x 6 round robin draw, and for the girls 1 x 12 draw and 1 x 6 round robin draw.

This year the Canterbury Masters & Junior Age Group and U23 tournaments was also hosted by Football from Thursday 12th to Sunday 15th August. Across the 3 events, there were 101 participants, with players travelling from as far away as Greymouth, Marlborough, Midlands, and Wellington.

The **Canterbury Masters** champions were Scott Gardiner of Burnside, and Erin Ellery of Greymouth. Both Open finals were relatively straight forward affairs, with Scott defeating Christchurch member Simon Slade in three games. The women's final was a repeat of the 2020 version, with Erin once again defeating Richmond's Shayle Pringle, this time in three games.

The **Junior Age Groups** tournament was slightly smaller than previous years, with 30 entries all up. However, there was still some high quality squash over the weekend. In the U17 Girls division, Rangiora's Anastasia Lim continued her impressive climb up the grading list, defeating Petra Curd-McCullough of Football in a hard fought three games. In the U17 boys, Tom Marshall of Marlborough beat Ryan Ko from Burnside, also in three games, while the U19 champion was Hoon Hay's Scott Butterick, who prevailed over Nathan Briggs, also of Burnside, in a tight five game match. Greymouth's Zac Pattinson and Rangiora's Dominic Lim took out the U15 and U13 Boys divisions respectively.

The **U23 Championships** were a smaller affair, with 8 men and 2 women entering, however there was still plenty of very impressive squash on show. In the women's match, home club member Emma Cormack defeated the rapidly improving Kayla Brocks of Christchurch in three games, while the men's final was an all-Marlborough match up and went the distance of five games: Tom Marshall outlasting Paul Moran in what was one of the matches of the tournament. A very impressive effort from Tom and many of the other Marlborough contingent, who had a huge weekend in playing both the Junior Age Groups and U23 Championships.

This year Football hosted a new tournament, namely the **Football Masters**. This event was held From Thursday 30th September to Saturday 2nd October. There were 39 participants, with a few late withdraws due to injury, however players travelled from Nelson, Marlborough, and Midlands. The numbers were impacted as Canterbury had only been out of COVID lockdown for a few weeks and the NZ Masters that were due to be played later in October had been cancelled, so the Canterbury team did not require to use this as a training event.

Divisions for the men were separated by ages of Over 50 and Under 50 however with smaller numbers the women were grouped together and determined by points. There were 2 divisions in each group and a number of close games particularly between Football players. This was a fun tournament for all and will be run again in 2022.

Thanks to the club captains Emma Cormack and Aaron Warner for their organising and team selection for interclub competitions. This was Emma's fourth year in the role and Aaron's third year.

Club Champs were postponed due to the lockdown for COVID so were held in early November and culminated with the prizegiving held after the finals. This year we ran the junior championships alongside the senior championships, and there were a number of competitive and hard fought games. Congratulations to our Senior Club Champions – Emma Cormack (Women's), Adam Odering (Men's), and Junior Club Champions – Petra Curd-McCullough (Girls), Jack Lamb (Boys), Arihia O'Driscoll (J Grade).


Currently we have 210 members which is 19 members more than this time last year (2020 – 191).

Finance

Financially the club made an operating profit of \$14,090 compared with the 2020 profit of \$33,232. This is in part due to the club COVID subsidies received for wages and income loss over the lockdown period during 2021 being considerably less than the Sports Canterbury Grant received in 2020. To give a more meaningful pre-Covid comparison, in 2019 the club had a slight operating loss of (\$1,909) so to have an operating profit of \$14,090 is a great result.

In 2021, the club received a total of \$20,885 from charitable trusts and grants (\$29,754 in 2020), including \$6,722 from Kiwi Gaming for the court LED light upgrade, \$3,950 from Mainland Foundation towards Squash Canterbury levies, \$8,908 in Wage subsidies and Resurgence payments from IRD and the remaining balance from donations to the club. This assisted the club greatly this year, however as in previous years funding is getting harder to receive and cannot be guaranteed when looking at the overall budget in ensuring the club can meet its ongoing costs.

Therefore, fundraising within the club continues to be an important income stream, this year raising \$5,450. The committee ran two main events: a Quiz night at Bailies Bar in February raising \$923 and also a night at Addington Races raising \$1,705. Other fundraisers included Fairlie Pies raising \$464 and the social golf day raising \$170. Thank you to Helen Benington who organised the Race night including the many raffles and the Fairlie Pie fundraiser and Richard King for organising the Golf day. Many thanks also to our social Thursday night members who supported raffles weekly throughout the year raising \$1,240.




Bar revenue has increased this year to net revenue of \$36,440, up from \$25,302 in 2020. The club hosted all the tournaments it was scheduled to during 2021 and the additional functions compared with 2020 assisted in this increase.

Our operating expenses were well maintained during this year with a return to normal levels after the reductions achieved during COVID lockdowns in 2020.

I thank our club sponsors who continue to support the club. Mary Turnbull (Harcourts), Roger Symes (Prime Kitchens), Anderson & Hill, Super Liquor Papanui, Lion Nathan and Ashton Wheelans. We are incredibly appreciative for their support, which assists our Football club to run as successfully as it does.

Bar/Social

We continue to hire out the club facilities, with 11 functions held throughout the year, (up from 5 in 2020, which was COVID impacted), with gross bar takings this year increasing to \$21,894 from \$7,171. Western Football used our facilities as their clubrooms for after match functions on Saturdays during the winter season, for the tenth year. Their season was shortened by approx. a month due to COVID which impacted the gross bar revenue attributable to Western to \$8,134 (a decrease from \$10,072 in 2020).



This year the club continued with our regular events including Summer League and Wednesday Club nights which continue to be successful, and areas for new members to be involved in and our 5-week winter leagues are also greatly enjoyed by our more social members. Our thanks to Denis for running our club nights and being so welcoming to potential and new members to our club, although it is with sadness that we have accepted Denis' decision to stand down from the club night facilitator role.

Towards the end of the year the Club Prizegiving was held in the club lounge, following the finals of the Club Champs and saw a mix of social, junior and senior members and families socialising together and enjoying the grazing platter from the Twisted Flour & Sugar Merchants which looked and tasted great with something to suit everyone!

Property

The committee decided to upgrade the courts lights, installing LED lights on the courts after covering the bulk of the costs with a funding application. At the same time LED lights were put in the corridor behind the courts and also the lounge lights were updated to LED lights with a dimmer switch, which is great for functions.

The glass washer in the bar was replaced and the chairs behind the courts were recovered.

Other repairs and maintenance for 2021 are mostly related to the quarterly building compliance costs, replacement of the two extractor fans in the changing rooms and replacement of the hand drier in the men's changing room.

Thanks to Hamish Oakley for looking after our gardens for the club.

Coaching and Junior Development

During 2021 Adam celebrated his 10th year anniversary as the Christchurch Football Squash Club Coach, however it is with sadness we have accepted Adam's resignation from this role as he moves in a different direction for his future. During 2021 Adam ran the Club's weekly junior programme with 20-30 juniors participating all year round, providing the foundation for the clubs junior development, success and participation. Adam was also involved with the Introductory Sessions organised twice throughout the year which provided group coaching for people new to squash. This has successfully had some of those participants join our Thursday social leagues to continue in their squash development.

Adam provided individual coaching to many club members and the wider squash community during 2021.

The club wish Adam well in the new chapter with his wife Zoe and son Quinn.

Thanks to the parents who continue to support the club in the junior area. And a thank you to Ethan Peddie for your work as our junior co-ordinator, and for running the Junior 2100 tournament held at Football.

Squash Canterbury

During 2021 Squash Canterbury had a change of personnel. Di McCoy moved on from the Junior Development Co-ordinator, and the focus of the role was widened to increase participation in any particular target group, so has been renamed as Participation Activator and was filled by Ryan Frampton from May. Unfortunately for the Squash community Kristy Havill resigned as CEO, as she went overseas to join

her partner in the UK. As there is a change of direction coming from Squash NZ, Ryan has also taken over the Operations Manager role in a temporary capacity while the outcome of this change for Squash NZ and the flow down into the districts is realised.

<u>Acknowledgements</u>

Thanks to the 2021 committee who worked hard and offered hours of unpaid support enabling the club to function as well as it does, especially the work required to manage the club during the COVID lockdown and implications of the many COVID levels.

Thanks to Grace Allen in the administrator role which covers the membership database functions and keeps you our members informed and up to date. Cheers to you Andrew for your efforts in keeping our bar well stocked, as this is much appreciated by us all. Thanks to Tony Stoneman who cleans the club each week, again it is appreciated.

The club has some very dedicated and hardworking volunteers, which are needed for the club to function. As mentioned in previous years' reports the club needs more people to volunteer where they can, across all functions of the club, whether working bees, tournament volunteers, committee members and to share the efforts required to keep our amazing club running. The more people that are involved gives another advantage of sharing the knowledge which is important for the longevity of the club. The committee welcome people to assist with any role, as not all roles require the time commitment of being on the committee.

To the incoming 2022 committee I wish you the best for your efforts in looking to increase the profile and membership of our great club, while also managing the day to day functions, and to all our members I look forward to seeing you all back on court in 2022.

TREASURERS REPORT 2021

I would like to present the Christchurch Football Squash Club financial statements for the year ended 31 October 2021.

The club has recorded an overall net loss (after depreciation) for the year of (\$12,822) compared to a net profit of \$5,881 in 2020.

The operating profit before depreciation in 2021 is \$14,090, compared to a profit of \$33,232 in 2020.

- Gross Income is \$36,440, up 39.5% on last year's \$26,124. This is due to the very good result on the bar which was assisted by a good string of functions across the year, and only partly damaged by August's lockdown. Many thanks to Helen Benington for assisting with the organisation of all these functions.
- Gross Bar Sales were up 42% to \$68,821, with net Bar Income up 44% to \$36,440. This translates to a Gross Profit of 52.95% which is slightly ahead of last year's 52.17%. Thank you once again to Andrew Hawkey for the huge effort that goes into keeping the bar ticking over.
- The Salming Shop brought in Net Income of \$822 in 2020, but was wound up this year with no related income or expenses booked. Thanks to Adam Ordering for setting the shop up, and for helping to bring it to a tidy conclusion.
- Subscription income increased 10% this year to \$44,580. This represents a good increase in playing numbers given that the level of all subs was frozen from the previous year.
- Sponsorship income was up 54.9% to \$5,098 this year. Many thanks to our sponsors: Mary Turnbull, Ashton Wheelans, Prime Kitchens, Super Liquor Papanui and Anderson & Hill. Also to Mary and to Nurse Call Solutions for their sponsorship of the Football Open in April/May.
- Tournament Income came in at a very healthy \$9,817 up 202% on the previous year's \$3,248. We were able to run all our tournaments this year, despite lockdowns and Covid level changes. Many thanks to Aaron Warner and to all volunteers, but a particular big thank you to Kirsty for doing all the organising, and for often taking on the tournament kitchen as well.
- Visitor Income was flat at \$2,840 compared to \$2,887 in 2020.
- Donations/Funding dropped back to \$20,885 this year, from the previous year's \$39,754. We did benefit from the ongoing support of Mainland Foundation and Kiwi Gaming (\$10,672 in total) as well as some government Covid subsidies later in the year, however, these latter payments were significantly less than the Sports Canterbury Resilience Fund payments received during 2020.
- Total operating expenses were \$117,577, an increase of \$25,766 or 28% on the \$91,811 of 2020. As 2020 was a decrease of 19.3% on the previous year, this partly represents a bounce-back to more normal expenditure levels.

- The biggest increases in expense line items were:
 - Tournament Expenses up \$7,529 due to running all tournaments again in 2021;
 - o Rent up \$5,955 due to the 3 months we got rent-free in 2020;
 - Repairs & Maintenance up \$2,787 (71%) mainly due to the reupholstering of the chairs, which was wholly covered by fundraising and member donations;
 - Coaching up \$2,730 due to the number of new member sessions run by Adam;
 - NZ Squash Levies up \$1,904 (39.7%) and Cleaning up \$1,143 (6.3%).
- Non-Operating Expenses (depreciation) total \$26,913 compared with \$27, 351 in 2020.
- The club has cash assets of \$37,949 as at 31 October 2021 compared to 44,539 as at 31 October 2020.
- Stock on hand in the bar at 31 October 2021 is \$6,490 compared with bar and Salming stocks of \$9,087 in 2020.
- The club has no term debt as at 31 October 2021.
- Fixed Assets are recorded at \$2,114,244 from the prior year balance of \$2,128,618. The club revalued the building in 2016 to the insurance value.

This year I'm pleased to be able to say that the Club has undertaken a significant upgrade of its' court lighting – with 60 new LED lights purchased for the 4 courts and for the hallway areas. At the same time we also bought 21 new downlights for the lounge, with an all-in lighting cost of \$9,583. A new glass-washer has also been purchased for the bar this year, offering a better service to all our bar customers.

Thank you to the Committee and to everyone involved in the related fundraising and belt-tightening efforts.

The Club continues to be in a solid Cash position, with \$37,000 in bank and term deposits, which will take us through into the new subscription year.

2022 offers us still more uncertainty, but I think we are in a solid position to respond to whatever it throws at us. A small increase in the 2022 subs (approx. 2% overall) has been approved to help us to try to navigate that.

Assurance Review Report 2021



INDEPENDENT ASSURANCE PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW REPORT

To the Members of Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated

We have reviewed the accompanying special purpose financial statements of Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated (the Club) on pages 5 to 10, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 October 2021 and the statement of financial performance and statement of movements in equity for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements including a summary of significant accounting policies.

The Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Committee is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the entity's accounting policies and for such internal control as the Committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Assurance Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with the International Standard on Review Engagements (New Zealand) ISRE NZ 2400, Review of Historical Financial Statements Performed by an Assurance Practitioner who is not the Auditor of the Entity. ISRE (NZ) 2400 requires us to conclude whether anything has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements, taken as a whole, are prepared in all material respects in accordance with the accounting policies disclosed. This standard also requires us to comply with ethical standards requirements.

A review of the financial statements in accordance with ISRE (NZ) 2400 is a limited assurance engagement. The assurance practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making enquiries, primarily of those responsible for financial and accounting matters, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less than those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand). Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on the financial statements.

Other than in our capacity as assurance practitioner, we have no relationship with, or interests in, Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated

Basis for Qualified Conclusion

There are limited systems of control over bar revenue received in cash which we could rely for the purpose of our review and there were no satisfactory review procedures that we could adopt to confirm independently that all cash income was properly recorded.

Qualified Conclusion

Based on our review, except for the effect of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Conclusion paragraph, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe the financial statements of the Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated on pages 5 to 10 do not present fairly the financial position of the Club as at 31 October 2021 and of its financial performance for the year then ended, in accordance with stated accounting policies.

Other Matters - Basis of Accounting Preparation

We draw attention to the basis of accounting preparation disclosed in the statement of accounting policies. These financial statements are a special purpose report prepared for the benefit of the Association's members only. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for any other purpose. Our report is intended for the members only.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated For the year ended 31 October 2021

Note 1 Statement of Accounting Policies

Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated, the reporting entity, is a Club. The Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated is registered as an Incorporated Society under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. These Financial Statements are a set of special purpose financial statements and have been prepared in accordance with stated accounting policies. The financial statements are only for the use of the Christchurch Football Squash Club Incorporated and its members and may not be suitable for another purpose.

Note 2 Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the year.

Note 3 Property, Plant & Equipment

Fixed Assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation, except for Buildings which are stated at valuation of April 2016. The valuation is an Insurance Replacement value prepared by Telfor Young dated 22 April 2016.

Plant and equipment value is calculated using the diminishing value method which is estimated to expense the cost of the assets over their useful lives. The Club have the following classes of assets:

Building 1%-13% Leasehold Improvements 10% Plant and equipment 9%-50%

Note 4 Measurement Base

The measurement base adopted is historical cost, modified by the revaluation of the buildings.

Note 5 Goods and Services Tax

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis, with the exception of Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable.

Note 6 Income Tax

The Club is wholly exempt from paying New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for this exemption, being sCW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Note 7 Inventories

Inventories are recorded at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs have been assigned to inventory quantities on hand at balance date using the first in first out basis.



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Note 8 Accounts Receivable

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

Note 9 Revenue Recognition

Subscription

Subscription income is accounted for on a cash received basis.

Sale of Goods

Sale of goods are recognised when the club has delivered the product to the customer.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised when it is accrued

Income from service activities

Income from service activities is recorded when the activity takes place.

Donations

Donations are recognised as revenue at the point of receipt and include donations from the general public and donations received for specific purposes.

Donations and grants with no "use or return" condition attached are recorded as revenue at the time of receipt. For any donations and grants with a "use or return" condition attached, any amounts unspent at balance date are recorded as a liability on the balance sheet until such time as the money is spent and the relevant conditions met.

Ladies Club Captain's Report 2021

Another interesting year adapting to playing squash within a global pandemic. Fortunately, the squash season ran much smoothly compared to last year as we had fewer interruptions and an eager squash community to rip into the new year!

Women's interclub and tournaments ran successfully throughout the year until mid-August when New Zealand received its first delta-variant community case of Covid19 in Auckland. Consequently, the whole country went into level 4 government lockdown, stopping squash completely. Winter interclub was cancelled, Junior and Masters individual and team nationals were cancelled completely, and our in-house Thursday league was also cancelled. Senior individual and team's national events were renamed to the Squash Classic events and postponed till late October and late November.

In the beginning of September, the South Island moved to level 2 government restrictions, allowing squash to start back up. Spring interclub, our in-house competition, and tournaments proceeded without a hitch.

Numbers

The club currently has 30 women listed as a member. The peak amount of women we had participating in women's interclub was 10, with a handful of our ladies competing in men's interclub. Thursday night league also attracts many women that do not regularly participate in competitions such as interclub and tournaments.

Interclub

Women's interclub this year stuck to the traditional layout with slight adjustments made to teams to keep the competition competitive. Each team played 4 players on the night, sets were to 15 points, and the default ball was a single yellow dot ball. In instances of some clubs lacking players to make full teams, teams were slightly adjusted to make them more even in strength. Our club could only field 2 teams for the whole year; however, with the assistance of Burnside Squash Club and Christchurch Squash Club, we were able to place some of our players in their teams.

Currently, the Women's Interclub Committee is establishing a trial next summer, which entails mixing women's interclub with men's. The practicalities of this trial have not yet been determined however once it is arranged it will be advertised to clubs. Many districts around the South Island have adopted the mixed division approach and have received positive feedback, so we can only hope we will receive similar feedback in Christchurch.

Christchurch Football Squash Club Awards Night

On the 7th of November, we celebrated the members of our club that displayed excellence in their squash and the roles they played this year.

The Women's Interclub Team Captain of the Year was Helen Benington. Helen has not only been an active captain of her interclub team, but she has also been a huge help to me the last few years with women's interclub in general. 
Squash Senior Team Classic

Coach's End of Year Report 2021

A Final Word

Classical music plays quietly in the background on a hot, windy summer day. It's December 21st, Christmas just around the corner, 2022 only a little further around the road still. A year that many of us will be happy to see in the rearview mirror. However, I find myself content sitting at the dining table of my mother in-laws (where we also reside) writing what will be my last ever article as club coach of Christchurch Football Squash Club. This is a meaningful moment in its own right, but I find myself spoiled with joy having my son Quinn sleeping in his pepi-pod on the table in front of me, having been home from the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) only a few hours. Having been born 7 weeks early, he has been in NICU for the past 3 and a half weeks where my wife and I have visited him every day. It has been far from easy, but right from the get go he improved and developed faster than nurses and doctors predicted, showing signs of his mothers determination and high standards of achievement.

As one journey ends, another begins. Ten and a half years I have devoted myself to my career as a squash coach. What a decade it has been, filled with star-studded moments of joy. From my early days as a 21-year-old kid, trying to make a far fetched dream a reality, I coached a 17-year-old Michael Taylor. This was before I had my role as club coach. I was still at Uni doing my coaching degree and met a kid as passionate about learning squash as I was about trying to teach it. In hindsight, and contrary to my self-perception at the time, I actually knew next to nothing about coaching, or squash. Luckily for both of us Michael was about as wise to it as I was, it was the blind leading the blind. Nonetheless, we muddled forwards as best we could. Now, 12 years later, he has almost eradicated all the bad habits I passed onto him through my trial and error, and I can vouch that he has become a very handy squash player, and to my greater delight, a close friend.

When I picked up the coaching role at the club in June 2011, my first Junior Squads consisted of some familiar faces who are on our committee today: A young Aaron Warner, and an even younger Emma Cormack. Aaron must have been around 16, and Emma perhaps only 11. It fills me with joy to see that squash has impacted their lives in a way that has led to them giving back to the game, our club, and the community through volunteering. To have played a role in this development, big or small, is an honour.

Skip forward a couple of years circa 2013/14, emerged a young crew of four year 9 Boys High kids: Matt Duncan, Mikey Baker, Jayden Millard and Charlie Barker. The latter pair will be familiar names to many reading this, as they have extended their development to become top A grade players. I'll always remember the days when they first became obsessed with squash. In the school holidays they'd arrive early in the morning and stay at the squash courts all day. The Chileshe boys, Lwamba and Temwa were also a part of the self-imposed school holiday squash camps. The boys would battle for hours, betting on who would win games of crazy, a game that I hated and lightly attempted to discourage. But who was I to get in the way of such good fun. Loser had to shout a bag of lollies from the dairy! Fond memories of Fish and chips for lunch, Charlie and his cucumbers, clash of clans, and plenty of banter.

I share just a couple of explicit examples from a pool of countless precious memories. I am blessed that it has been rich with such joy. Joy that stems from building close relationships with individuals and families. If you were to ask me what was the single best thing about my time coaching, I would say hands down, without a doubt, it is the relationships I have built with people. Some only short, some still standing, each one meaningful in its own way. I couldn't go without at least summarising those who have impacted me on my journey. This comes at the unforgivable expense of leaving some people out by name, that certainly deserved to be mentioned, but have slipped my mind at the current moment. To those I acknowledge now, for every person who has been a part of my coaching journey, has had an impact on me, and I thank you all for accompanying me on this ride.

To all the juniors who have been a part of my Squads Program, past and present; to the families I have worked with over the years: the Allen's, Webster's, Lamb's, Peddie's, Millard's, McCullough's and many others; to the past and current club presidents John Horwood, Helen Bennington, Ian Trenberth, and Kirsty Whiteside; and to all committee members who have been a part of the team alongside them; to those pupils that voluntarily chose the hard road to play amongst the best: Emma, Jayden, Charlie, Paul and Petra; to Brigid, Sharon, Richie and Wayne, thank you for your wisdom and kindness, for you have taught me at least as much as I have taught you; To Rod Hayes: mentor, coach, squash genius, and friend; for the opportunities I have generously received through Kashif at Salming, Jason at Stellar, Squash Canterbury, Squash Midlands, and Squash New Zealand; to all my current young students, I regret that our journey has come to a premature end, I hope you find fulfilment in squash as you continue on your paths; and to everyone else, inside and outside the club, near and far. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart for the experiences we have had together.

Through meaningful relationships we can experience life in the truest sense. Helping each other achieve goals that you couldn't achieve on your own. Connecting with others beneath the surface, struggling together on and off the squash court.

Lending a hand, showing up for someone, and being shown up for.

Believing in someone, and having someone believe in you.

Rallying another as they fight through adversity, or cheering for them as they scale their mountain and reach the summit.

Learning from one another, opening up, listening.

Being vulnerable. Being strong. Growing. Climbing.

Realising that you can be better than you are with a little discipline, work and grit. Lifting each other up as we scale to great heights, and helping those up off the ground who have fallen.

I remember a few months ago I was listening to a Jordan Peterson lecture that took place at Cambridge university in the UK. In the Q and A section Jordan was asked by a member of the audience "what advice would you give to a man who is about to be a father for the first time?" He replied:

"You have the opportunity in front of you to have the best relationship you've ever had with anybody in your life. Now, if you do that right, that's what you can have."

In this current moment, these words mean more to me than ever. As I type these final words, Quinn is stirring a little bit in his sleep. He flops his head over to face me showing off his angelic tiny features and lets out a few impossibly adorable sounds.

In this precise moment, time stands still. Right here, right now, is exactly where I am supposed to be. These rare, precious moments of joy that seem to break down the fabric of space and time. This is what life is all about.
